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For Which Verses Should We Make Sajdah al- Tilaawah? Sajdah (prostration) is performed on reciting or hearing another person recite one of the Ayaat al-Tilaawah (Verses of Prostration) of the Holy Our'an.

The locations of these verses are marked in the Arabic text of the Ouran (*mus-haf*) with a symbol in the shape of a *mihrab*. The fifteen verses are:

Ouran 7:206: Ouran 13:15: Quran 16:49; Quran 17:107; Quran 19:58; Quran 22:18; Quran 22:77* This verse is questioned as a verse of *sajdah* by some scholars. There are unconfirmed reports that early Muslims did not prostrate at this verse, but others cite a lack of evidence. So, some scholars count it while others do not; Ouran 25:60; Ouran 27:25; Quran 32:15; Quran 38:24; Quran 41:37; Quran 53:62; Quran 84:21; and Ouran 96:19.



DID YOU KNOW Inshallah and Mashallah


